Dear Sir:

Enclosed I hand you certified sketch with a statement, or explanation, of said sketch made by Geo. M. Williams, State Surveyor, the sketch and the statement both being of date February 28th, 1914, showing the location of Survey No. 150, S. K. & K., the J. G. Allen and G. W. King Surveys with reference to each other.

This sketch is made from actual work on the ground, and shows that Mr. Williams identifies the original N. E. corner of Survey No. 141, B. S. & F., also identifies the original N. E. corner of S. K. & K. By reference to file No. 4490 in your office, you will find field notes for the King survey made by C. I. Browder, deputy Surveyor of King County, April 15th, 1892, which calls for the S. E. corner of the King Survey to be located on the West boundary line of S. K. & K.

Also in the same file is original field notes made by A. C. Tackitt, deputy Surveyor, Knox Land District, and approved by C. Hood, District Surveyor, Knox Land District, showing the survey made November 4th, 1893, giving practically the same field notes locating the S. E. corner of the G. W. King survey on the W. B. line of S. K. & K., Survey No. 150. I call attention to these original field notes in support of Mr. Williams' plat, or sketch, enclosed herein, and which field notes and sketch shows there is no vacancy between the G. W. King 160 acre survey and the S. K. & K. Survey No. 150.

Please file this sketch and statement in the proper files and if there are any filing fees due for same, kindly notify me, and I will remit you.

Dear Sir:

I have made a sketch showing connections from the N.E. Corner of Sec. 141 B.S. & F. - King County to the N.E. Corner of the S.O. Frazier preemption. The N.E. Corner of 141 is identified by calls for creek. The N.E. Corner of Sec. 148 is identified by two mesquite bearings still standing but dead. This corner is known as the "buffal head corner." I set a pipe mtd. S.E. 163 at this corner beside a set stone previously placed by some one else. It is 5853 ft. from this corner to N.E. Corner of 141. On this map I call this line joining these corners N & S.

At the S.W. corner of Sec. 149 Stone Kyle & Kyle, there is an old stone mtd. to which I added an iron pipe mtd. S.W. 149 S.K & K. This corner has a bearing, two mesq. stamps that fit original calls. The surveyor of King Co. W. T. Tackett was with me at this corner and he told me that he saw the mesquite trees when they were standing and showed the original marks. This is a well known corner and <sup>has</sup> been recognized by surveyors as the original corner. From N.E. Corner of 148 Tol. is 3902 vs. to this corner and the course is 0-6' greater than a right angle to line connecting N.E. of 141 and the N.E. 148, see sketch. I placed S.W. corner of 150 one mile

west of the original S.E. corner of 150  
and the N.W. corner of 150 I place  
1 mile west and 1/2 mile N. of the  
original S.E. Cor. 150. Extending the west  
line of 150 N. <sup>133.4</sup> vs. <sup>vs.</sup> strike S. 2 mi of No. 2  
127.3 vs W. of S.W. E. corner of said Sur.  
and from the S.W. E. corner of 2 it is  
1919.6 vs. a little south of west along  
S. Line up to the N.E. corner of the S.O.  
Frazier Sur. as it was originally improved  
and surveyed. This work was all done  
by me on the ground and thoroughly  
checked. in October 1913.
