

Field Notes of a Survey of a Grant in the name of Carlos Martinez, situated in the Counties of Karnes and Bee, Tex, on the right bank of the San Antonio River: said survey having been made under an order of the District Court of Karnes County, at its fall term of 1868.

Beginning at the lower corner on the San Antonio River, of a Grant calling for 4 Leagues, in the name formerly of Joaquin^o Martin de la Garza. This corner was established by the undersigned, in the year 1861, when making a Survey of the said Garza Grant under an order of the Hon District Court of Karnes County, given in a case between Russell^o & McLane. - This corner is S. 45° E. - 5300 Yrs and S. 45° W. 70 Yrs from the mouth of the Cañada de San Javier (which is the upper and beginning corner of the Garza Grant) and is to be found on the bank of the San Antonio River, at a bend, about 100 yds to the Eastward of the house of Burriss, above which bend, there is a hill with motts of Live Oak, coming near to the river. At this point set a stake - from

which a Pecan 8 inches in diameter, marked by me \times in 1861, bears S. 29 $\frac{1}{2}$ ° E. 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ Varas and another Pecan 12 in diam bears N. 72 $\frac{3}{4}$ ° E. 9 $\frac{1}{4}$ Varas. —

Thence ran down the San Antonio River for front, three Leagues or 15,000 varas on a base line running S. 45° E. terminating the front at a point, at the edge of the timbered bottom of the river, about 50 vrs from the waters edge, which point is S. 45° E. 15,000 Vrs and S. 45° W. 2805 vrs from the lower corner of the Garza Grant - it is about 200 vrs below a horse power mill in the prairie, and about one quarter of a mile above a fence said to be that of Mr^s Ferryman. - Here set a stake, from which a Pecan 14 inches in diam, marked \equiv bears N 15° E. 6 vrs, and another 20 in. in diam marked also \equiv bears S. 48° E. 13 vrs. - Thence S. 45° W. parallel to the lower line of Joaquin^o Martin de la Garza survey, 890 vrs to the old La Bahia road, 1400 vrs to a Laguna, at 4120 vrs, struck Hondo Creek, at 4170 vrs left it 8770 vrs to a hollow running to the North and West, 9410 vrs to a road running Southward, 9660 vrs to a branch running to the Northwest, 11640 vrs to the top of a Spur putting to the N. W. 12650 Vrs to a hollow running towards the Northwest

14.480 vrs to a road, running North and South, 14.750 vrs to a hollow running North West, at 15.120 vrs a lone Live Oak 30 inches in diameter, stands 10 varas to the right of the line, 21.150 vrs crossed a branch of Medio-Creek, at 21.200 vrs crossed Main Medio-Creek, 23.150 vrs to top of a mesquite Hill, and 25.000 Varas or 5 Leagues, to the most Southern corner of this Survey.

Thence N. 45° W. 15.000 vrs to its most western corner.

Thence N. 45° E. across several hollows running to the Northward & Eastward 98.05 vrs to the South corner of the Garra 4 League Grant, on Pajaritos Hill, at 12.000 vrs a Settlement, the house thereon said to be Pace's about one quarter of a mile to the South East, 14.075 vrs to the Espuela (Spur) Creek, a branch of the Escondida Creek, at 20.825 cross the Escondida proper, at 21.630 vrs Pat Rose's Settlement about 400 vrs to the Southeast, 26.055 vrs to the Parrita Cr., 27.360 vrs to the Old La Bahia Road and 27.805 varas to the place of beginning.

This Cause being duly called for trial, Came the Party Plaintiffs by their Attorneys, and Continue the Cause as to the Executors of Ass Mitchell, deceased, M. N. Shivo, P. H. Rose, the heirs of Benjamin Burris deceased, and the heirs of Burnell Butler, deceased; said Burnell Butler, having departed this life since the beginning of this suit; thereupon, also Came by answer, the following named defendants, to-wit:

Translations:

Captain Louis Carrold, Sir. With due and proper submission, I, Carlos Martinez, a native of the town of San Fernando, Royal Presidio of San Antonio de Bexar, and an inhabitant for fourteen months of this Royal Presidio of La Bahia del Espiritu Santo, most humbly and respectfully represent to you, that I am a son of one of the ancient settlers of the before mentioned Presidio of Bexar, and have been in the service of his Majesty the King (whom God preserve) for sixteen years at his royal Military posts, such as the Royal Presidio of La Bahia -

That I have served twelve years during the time Captain Manuel de la Posona commanded and two years during the term of Captain Francisco Thevar under whom I enlisted.

Of the many battles which during that time we had with Indians, I will merely call your attention to two, in one of which we brought in one hundred and fifty warriors (borados) the Commander of our detachment being Augustin de Cosmo and an - other in which we took a large number of horses loaded with meat, the Commander of our detachment then being Ensign Bernabe Caravejal; omitting the mention of various skirmishes and pursuits which did not amount to battles.

I also beg leave to submit to your consideration that two of my brothers, lost their lives by the hands of the enemy; as well as that the blood of my ancestors, has been continually shed, on this frontier, and in like manner would it have happened, in the defence of the Presidio of Bexar, when the

Garrison would have perished had it not been that my deceased father, through devine providence, killed the Indian Chief of the Apachos, the tribe which attacked the said Presidio of Bexar, and which act was sufficient to cause the enemy to retreat.

And in as much as it is the benign and charitable purpose of our sovereign, as appears by his royal decrees, wherein he most solemnly charges that the first conquerors and actual settlers of the frontiers of his dominions should be attended to and favored in preference to all others:

I have concluded to petition and pray, that you may do me the favor, to give me possession of Eight leagues of land of the public domain, now vacant for the purpose of establishing a stock farm for raising cattle.

Beginning at the place where the land of Joachin de la Garza corner,

Thence with the River downward the distance of three leagues and extending back towards the Nueces on a straight line, the distance of five leagues, and that you may at the time after these documents shall have been completed, order the proper copy of them to be given to me, in order to pay such fees as may be due to his Majesty in view of all which I pray you may be pleased to grant this my petition in the manner herein expressed, it being justice which I implore, and that you will admit this petition on the present common paper, there being no sealed paper, I make oath in due form, that this is in good faith, with all other necessary protestations & C -

In the Royal Presidio de La Bahia del Espirato Santo this seventh day of the Month of June of the year one thousand seven hundred and eighty eight.

I, Don Luis Cazorla, Captain of Cavalry of the above Garrison, Military Commandant of the same and Governor and Chief Justice of the town and district; by the King our Lord (whom God preserve) in consideration of the petition presented by Carlos Martinez, a native of the town of San Fernando de Austria in the Presidio of Bexar, and now a resident of this place, under my command and in view of his respectability, good conduct and services, of which I am well informed. By virtue of the authority which his Majesty has condescended to vest in me, in Chapter 1st, Section 11th of the Royal Regulations, and Instructions for the government of presidios, dated 10th December of the past year, one thousand seven hundred and seventy two. I grant to the before mentioned Carlos Martinez the grant of land of the Royal Domain which he solicits in his petition, with all the obligations provided in the aforesaid regulations to Cultivate them and to have horses, arms and ammuniton in readiness to go against the enemy, whenever necessity may require, and he may be ordered to be subject in all things to the authority to which he will recur in primary instances and in like manner to the ecclesiastical tribunal within the jurisdiction of this Parish, ti being well understood, that said Grant is not to prejudice

any other jurisdiction, or the interests of adjoining parties, in any right they may have in case claim should be made until the point is decided by law: he the before mentioned Carlos Martinez being liable to service in his turn as a Municipal Officer in Common with others of this Presidio, as inhabitant of the same: under which conditions I grant and confirm the before mentioned grant of land at the places he designated.

I will also do the same, when he shall apply for a town lot, in the said Presidio, upon which to build a house without injury to a third party; and in order that this my decree may serve the before mentioned Carlos Martinez for his security and legitimate title, I as in duty bound to order, do Command, that an authenticated copy of it be given to him, and that the original be placed in the Archives of this district under my Commando as governor of the same: that it may there appear at all times, in testimony whereof and by this my decree, thus did I adjudge and subscribe with my attendant witnesses, with whom I execute official acts in the absence of a Notary (there being none, either Royal or Public) in the manner prescribed by law, and on the present common papers, as sealed paper is not used in this province to all of which I certify.

The inhabitant of this province, Carlos Martinez, having sufficiently proven the injustice, with which you have endeavored to dispossess him of the Rancho named San Jose, which he has acquired by a legal title, I have placed upon the report, which for a qualification of his proceeding I ask of impartial persons the following decree:

Valley of Santa Rosa
May 27th, 1789

With respect to the Rancho, which it has been attempted to dispossess Carlos Martinez, is situated in the Jurisdiction of the Presidio de la Bahía del Espiritu Santo, the population of which is Military, and as the Rancho was acquired by that party lawfully, the proceedings taken by the Governor of Texas, in violation to this subject is unjust-

The Commandant of the Presidio de la Bahía del Espiritu Santo, will protect and maintain the aforesaid Martinez in the possession of the aforesaid Rancho, named San Jose, without the Governor of the Province, or any other person being permitted to disturb or dispossess him of it unless vanquished by a due course of law, in a proceeding prosecuted by all the forces of a Court of Justice, to his dispossession or expulsion; give orders that in said case only, and in no other, will this General Head Quarter Communicate with the aforesaid commandant of Captain of the Presidio de la Bahía del Espiritu Santo.

V GALDE

I transcribe it for your information that the suit is suspended which has been instituted without any reason against the said Martinez and to the end also, that in your proceedings you will take care to maintain Justice, and protect the unfortunate, when persons of power, or Landlords, attempt to oppress them, that they should have recourse to the remedy in their necessity - God guard you many years.

Beginning at the lower corner, on the San Antonio River, of a Grant calling for 4 leagues in the name formerly of Joaquin and Martin de la Garza.

Witness was born in San Antonio de Bexar on the 12th day of January in the year 1800, and has lived in San Antonio all his life -

I first knew Carlos Martinez when I was about 8 years old -

Carlos Martinez was killed by the Indians in 1815;

Carlos Martinez lived at his ranch from the time I knew him first, until his death; his Rancho was situated on the South side of the San Antonio River, near the Escondido Creek in what was then Bexar, now Karnes County.

The Rancho in his judgment was situated about one & a half of 2 leagues from where Helene now is. I was at the Rancho in 1834; was sent down against the Tonkaway Indians - Carlos Martinez then lived there with his family -

The Escondido was then called Galbazes and sometimes Espantifore and Indian name; when I was a boy, I heard Carlos Martinez tell some old men, that he, Carlos Martinez had settled the Rancho in 1773. I heard all the old people say when I was a boy say it was a very old Rancho. It was a Rancho that always had plenty of horses, cattle, sheep & Hogs.

Witness knew all the Plaintiffs mentioned in the Petition. They were the children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren of Carlos Martinez.

The houses and fences of Carlos Martinez were destroyed in 1843, by a company of white people who came to the Rancho from the Guadeloupe and Colorado Rivers, killed the people at the Rancho and stole their stock.

This Rancho of Carlos Martinez was called a frontier Rancho until of late years, and this predatory warfare continued until 1846 -

Some of the grand-children of Carlos Martinez married with Gallan, and some with Manchaca, and some with Justo Rodriquoz, and Josepha Martinez, a great-granddaughter, married Francisco Jurez. These are all the descendants I know of Carlos Martinez.

Plaintiff then introduced a witness, R. A. Rutledge, who testified as follows:

My Father moved on the land in Controversy in the fall of 1851 and lived in a Camp, until the Spring of 1852, when he built a house on the land, about one mile above the mouth of the Escondido Creek -

In the Fall of 1852 my Father took a lease from R. H. Horde and acted as an agent for said Horde in protecting the timber on the land, and from trespasses -

My Father continued to act as agent for said Horde until his death in 1862 or 3.

There was a written agency from Horde.

Horde was the Atty of the Plaintiffs in this suit.

My father lived upon the land as the tenant and agent of Horde from the fall of 1857 until he died.

The Written Agency I speak of, cannot be found among my Father's papers.

My Father placed John Ricks on the land as a tenant of Pliffs in 1852 and Ricks has so resided on the land up to the present time.

Horde was a Lawyer and the Atty of Martinez, Cundiff wanted to lease the land to my Father, but Father would not accept a lease. Cundiff then threatened to throw our things out of the house when my Father showed him the written agency from Horde and Cundiff respected the Agency.

Mr. Burnell Butler also respected the Agency given my Father by Horde.

Plaintiff then introduced A. D. Evans who was duly sworn and testified as follows:

He know Abraham Rutledge - He was my Father-in-law. I always understood Mr. Rutledge was Horde's agent, and that Horde was the attorney for representative of the Martinez claim. Thinks there was a writing between Rutledge & Horde.

I have searched within the last few days among my Father-in-Law's papers, and could not find the agency.

I first know Mr. Rutledge in 1859-

Plaintiff then introduced T. T. Teel, who being duly sworn, testified as follows:

I know Horde to be the attorney of the Martinez Heirs.

Plaintiff then introduced G. H. Nichols, who being duly sworn, testified as follows:

I know Abraham Rutledge 8 or 10 years previous to his death; know he was the agent of the land in Controversy and went to him once to get a tree and he told me I could have one tree which I got.

L. S. Lowhon was introduced by Plaintiffs, and being duly sworn, testified as follows:

I know Robert H. Horde, he was a lawyer, and the Agent and Attorney of the Plaintiffs.

He came to Karnes County, Texas, in 1857 or 8 on business connected with the land in Controversy.

Plaintiffs here closed their evidence, and the Defendants offered none.

After argument of Counsel, the Jury received the Charge of the Court and retired to consider of their verdict, and returning into Court rendered the following verdict, to-wit:

We, the Jury, find for the Plaintiffs, and that the Plaintiffs are the heirs and descendants of Carlos Martinez.

Belvin to Theodore Schliming be also cancelled, annulled and held for naught, and also all that Patents, Certificates or other pretended Claims of this or any other of these defendants be cancelled, annulled and held for naught and that each and every one of the defendants in this cause as well as all other persons are restrained and enjoined from setting up any claim or title under or by virtue of any certificate, patent, location, survey, or deed of any of the said defendants.

It is further ordered, adjudged and decreed that all of the Patents, deeds, certificates, surveys and locations or other evidences of claim of all of said defendants to said land be annulled, cancelled and held for naught and all of the title of in and to said lands be fully vested in said Plaintiffs and divested out of said Defendants, and that all cloud on the title of said Plaintiffs to said land be and are hereby removed and that their title and grant from the Spanish Government to Carlos Martinez be recognized and established.

It is further ordered, adjudged and decreed that the Defendants R. H. Belvin and his wife, Carolino W. Belvin, W. J. Joyce and his wife, Laura Joyce, H. A. Mitchell, Nat Mitchell, A. J. Mitchell, Wallace Mitchell, Henry C. Thompson, Medora Thompson, J. H. McLeary and Emily McLeary, heirs of Asa Mitchell, do have and recover of and from the plaintiffs Jose M. Martinez, Francisco Martinez, Santa Martinez, and Justa Martinez, her husband, Miguel Martinez, Juana Martinez, Demetrai Martinez, Caronecena Martinez, Jose Martinez, Antonio Galan, Francisco Galan, Joaquin Galan, Appolanin Galan, Porfirio Manchaca, Maria Guadalupe Manchaca, Trivino Manchaca, Jose Maria Martinez, Josefa Martinez, and Francisco Jurez, all of the following tract or parcel of land.

Beginning at the South West corner of a survey made for the heirs of Wm. Brisbin a post from which a Mosquito marked x. bears North 36 deg. E. 11 varas;

Thence North 20 deg. W. 2010 varas a dry creek 2300 varas to the Medio dry 2370 varas a small dry creek 5099 varas to the North West corner of this survey a post from which a mosquito marked X bears South 6 deg. E. 24 varas and another mosquito marked X bears South 6 deg. W. 31 varas.
