Dear Sir

In regard to the correction

of the Foster Levers survey and the Hannibal Boney survey I would ask for instruction in regard to making the same. It appears from the records, that said 2 surveys and the J. B. Porter survey have been made at the same time by E. A. Hensold, and that said surveyor has marked the Northcorners of said Porter survey, but not those of the 2 other surveys by bearing trees, which can be identified yet, although by true chaining these corners of the other two would have been near trees. I find further, that taking the corners of the J. B. Porter and running from them N  $14^{\circ} 0' \frac{685-5}{685-0}$  we reach what heretofore has been considered the backline of the Boney and Levers surveys, having a field fence & a schoolhouse on it. 685m is the difference between the Porter upper & the Boney lower line. Unfortunately said surveyor commented his fieldnotes of said 3 surveys from above, and running the upper line of the Levers  $N 14^{\circ} 0' 3470m$  we don't reach said other line by 425 acres, the same is true of the Boney, the upper line of which would go 50 acres further out than the Levers. The Porter lower line run out from the river is the only line which comes to its marked corner all right, and I presume this was the only line run out by Hensold, his meanders in their inaccuracy speak for themselves, and if used the same to establish the lengths of the other lines of said 3 surveys, the result is what we find a blunder all the way through, for his meanders are not the meanders of to day. Now, sir, more than one half of these surveys, have been until recently under water caused by a raft in the San Antonio River, which has made any work over there almost impossible, they are dry

now, the raft having gone above, being now at the Tally survey, the old riverbed is almost dry, its waters breaking over the banks mostly in Douglas County. This will explain and to some degree account for Hensold's work at the river. Then we have his fieldnotes one way contradicting his work and still his work is in my opinion what ought to guide us, I believe we have to follow the footings of the surveyor; still his fieldnotes are in favor of the State, can we set them aside? The result of a survey in accordance with the established line, would be: Hannibal Boney 640 acres Foster Lewis 127 $\frac{3}{4}$  acres, losing in conflict with the Trarieser 62 acres to the inside line, that is 347 acres from the river, 88 acres between the 2 lines, or 150 acres in all, and a survey of  $10\frac{3}{4}$  acres between the H. Boney line and the outside line as shown by plat. The result the other way would be Foster Lewis 121 $\frac{1}{4}$  acres, H. Boney 59 $\frac{3}{4}$  acres and 100 acres State land, the surrounding surveys having been patented. Nobody ever doubted the established back line, it has been held so by W. H. Allen my predecessor and by myself in establishing the lines of the M. E. Kay, the Byas Scott & the N. Miller surveys, every fieldnote calling for it. Here another matter has to be considered, the original surveyor placed the Lewis in conflict with the Trarieser league, we cannot verify said mistake perhaps, but although the corrected fieldnotes would here to exclude said conflict, we might have to take from the river out 120 acres and then deduct said conflict as it then exists, or run to the established backline and then exclude it.

Now, Sir, as I have on file an application to purchase said State land, also for the correction of the Lewis and Boney, an understanding <sup>into</sup> a ruling from you would save a great deal of work for me and your officers. The first question is, have we to go by the surveyor or his work as it appears on the ground, the second how we save a man from a conflict of his own choosing, although circumstances permit us to do so or not?

I can give you no opinion of my own in this matter  
except such as is right and so held by you.
