

Statement concerning the resurvey of
the Andrew J. Dunlap 640 acres
Survey, situated in N.W. part of
Wharton County at the forks of the
Sandy and Golden Rod Creeks

The said Dunlap Sur. begins 570 ^{or}
North of N.E. cor. of J. Williams at a magnolia
on West bank of a deep slough on
the E. line of the L.D. Cottle Sur. The N.E.
cor. of the J. Williams Sur. and S.E. cor. of
the L.D. Cottle Sur. is one and same
corner and calls to be on the West
bank of Sandy Creek. To find W. line
of the Dunlap Sur. I began at a cor.
made for N.W. corner of said Sur. by
Putman, a surveyor of Jackson Co.
and ran South on a random
I found an old marked line, first
on a leaning Post Oak, at point - about
410 ^{or} S. and 34 ^{or} W. of said corner
set ~~on~~ ^{at} old line tree and continued
S. - crossing Golden Rod Creek, found
an other line tree, a live Oak 24 ⁱⁿ
about 330 ^{or} S. of said creek. continued
S. at 2280 ^{or} top of high bank on
W. side of a deep slough at 2286 ^{or},
point on W. bank of said slough

from which a Magnolia - wood =
on E and W. sides and standing
in low bottom between the said
slough and Sandy Creek. W. East
said tree being a very old live tree
as evidenced by its marks.

Continued S. following said W. bank
of slough for a distance of 160 v^{ers}
at 25-25 v^s. crossed said slough
at 285'6 v^s the W. bank of Sandy
Creek. bearing trees of Pottle are gone
The point where the old line ~~to~~ crosses
old line projected N. from the Magnolia
line^{tree} is on the W. bank of the
slough. The W. bank here is in fact
the top of the low bottom bank
at edge of high bottom it is steep and
sharply defined, has large timber
on it. showing that it has not
changed for ages. This point I
decided to be the approximate S.W.
Cor. of the Demlap. Sur. It is exactly
300 v^s East to the W. bank of Sandy
Creek and 570 v^s S. to said
Creek. (W bank), which fits old call
It is 730 v^s N. to Golden Rod. (old call
make it. 800 v^s). I went to point-1800'
N of this corner. found no evidence
of old bearings and compassed and
measured to point 2887. v^s N. of
where old line struck W. bank
of Sandy Creek and hunted

for N.E. Cor. of Cottle Sur. The old bearings are gone, but course and distance put me at S. point of a high bank overlooking deep ravine this point ~~is~~ has post oak timber on it and is such a place as is called for in field notes of the Cottle Sur. I ran East on random, from the course and distance N.W. Cor. of the Dunlap Sur, and failed to find any land marked. - continued ^u E 2040 _vs. to stake on E. side of a branch and 20 _vs. from same. This stake was set by John Lacey for the N.E. Cor. of the A.J. Dunlap Sur, and S.W. Cor. of the William Sur, of 640 acres. This stake fits the branch and slough as called for in original field notes. A line run S. from this stake will cross Sandy Creek and a slough just S. of creek. The slough is the correct distance S. of ~~the~~ the creek to fit calls on E. line of Dunlap. but it is excessive to creek. A line run E. from the said stake will cross Sandy Creek and a slough also

The bearings to N.E. corner of A. D. Dunlap
Sur. as reestablished. ~~it~~ are as follows.

high bank of creek bottom
It is excessive to creek, but the slough
and bank of bottom are nearly a
fit - as to distances from creek as
called for in field notes of Wickham
S. line. The Wickham begins at N.E. cor.
A. D. Dunlap. Sur. Thence N. at 850',
prairie with motts of timber at
1200', open prairie, 1900',
and Thence it runs E. it calls
for timber at 900'. - I fit all of
these calls nicely. This stake
is, I think, as near true N.E. cor.
of the Dunlap as it can ever be
placed and from it I and Mr.
Lackey resurveyed the H and G.C.
Survey's running course and dis-
tance on a variation of 8° 30' E. the
same as used on the Dunlap.
The ^{re-}survey of the Dunlap was made in
Nov. 1898.
