That I went along with old Simone, the Indian Guide from Ysleta as interpreter, at different times—(the oldest guide in the country) and that this Spring in the Guadalupe mountains was so known to him.

I make this additional statement to show that I know both Springs, Martin Spring in the Guadalupe mountains and San Martin Spring in the Apache mountains.

I, H.F. Gasky, being duly sworn depose and say, I am a resident of El Paso County, Texas, I am and have been for a number of years, Deputy Sheriff of El Paso County. I came to El Paso County in 1862 and served as a Scout in the U. S. Army from 1862 to 1864. During my said service I was in the country now comprising the Counties of Reeves, Presidio, Jeff Davis and El Paso Counties. I know the location and names of the mountains, springs, streams and water holes in said Counties. I have since 1862, known the location of San Martin Spring or Springs in the Apache Mountains. The Apache Mountains are South of the Texas and Pacific Railroad and San Martin Spring in the Apache Mountains is about three hundred yards South of the Texas and Pacific Railroad. It lies between Gomez Peak in the Apache mountains and the T. & P.R.R.

There is not and never was any Spring known as San Martin Spring ~~on~~ ^{spring} Soldilo Creek, or any San Martin in the Apache Mountains North of the Texas and Pacific Railroad.

I have examined the printed maps of El Paso County, published by the Texas and Pacific Railroad and the point indicated thereon as the corner of Reeves, Presidio and El Paso Counties, is San Martin Spring in the Apache Mountains. And has been so known to the People and Indians and Mexicans for the past forty years. A number of years ago I served as Deputy Tax Collector of Presidio County and was with a party of Surveyors engaged in running the boundary line between Pecos and Presidio Counties. This was about 1875, San Martin Spring, in the Apache mountains was then recognized and unquestioned as the corner of said Counties and was so established and a monument erected thereon. The San Martin Spring in the Apache Mountains was always located and indicated on the U.S. Army maps as it is indicated on the Texas and Pacific Railroad Map herein

referred to. I served as Deputy Sheriff, Deputy Tax Collector and Inspector of hides and animals of Presidio at different times and was familiar with the established boundary line between said Counties. This Spring was so known and used as a watering and camping place by the soldiers and travelers through that part of the country.

Referring to N. F. Gaskins affidavit will state, that there never was a County line run in 1875 between Presidio & San Martin Co. see records of G. L. O. and that Thos. Nelson built the monument at San Martin Spring as now called, in 1880 or 1881. on his report filed in G. L. O.

That Gaskins either has in view the Spring on Salado Creek as San Martin Spring or his memory is so bad he can't be relied upon, because he states there is a Spring in Guadalupe Mts. Called Martin Spring & that it is 35 miles S.W. from San Martin Spring, whereas a matter of fact is is some 60 miles from Gomey Mts. to Guadalupe Mts. He also pretends to tell why Martin Spring was so named, whereas a matter of fact that it was named by Mexicans many years prior to Mr. Gaskins coming to this country, and as every one knows, they generally name a spring or even a child after the day on which it was found, and there is no doubt this spring was so named. Another fact I would state to the Commissioners is that there is no difference in the meaning between Paint & San.

I consider this affidavit as conflicting and not to be relied upon.
