Andrew J Baker Commissioner of the
General Land Office Austin Texas
I the Undersigned represent to you how
that I was appointed by the Honorable
County Court of Mills County Texas
on the 12th day of February 1898 as
special surveyor for Mills County Texas
to survey mark out and establish
the boundary line between Mills, Brown,
Comanche, Hamilton and Lampasas
Counties, respectively, said order issue
ed by the said County Court of Mills
County directing me to begin said
survey, on the 18th day of April 1898,
and to begin said survey at the North
corner of said Mills County, which is
situated and established in the
South line of the F. Ybarbo Survey
1550 vs West of its South East corner,
and in obedience to said order I
repaired to said North corner of said
Mills County, on the 18th day of
April 1898, did begin to make
the survey as directed in said
order now as required by Chapter
Four Article 806 of the Revised
Statutes of Texas, I respectfully
submit the following statement,
1st as no representative appeared from
either of the adjoining Counties I
proceeded alone as directed to
survey mark and establish the
line between Mills and Brown

Counties to the E line of Brown County and West line of Comanche County.

2nd At the 19th day of April 1898 W. T. Saxon Surveyor for Hamilton County Met me at the S.W. corner of Comanche County, but refused to accept the West line of Comanche as claimed by McIntosh late surveyor of Brown County, and also by Messrs Holman and Bussey both late Surveyors of Comanche ^{County} but which he accepted it being the best evidence at hand by which I could be governed, Mr Saxon stated that he ^{had} surveyed marked and established, the North boundary line of Hamilton County in the year 1880, and established the N.W. corner of said County, which was also then the S.W. corner of Comanche County but that the distance was excessive three or four hundred Varas, he also stated that no action was ever taken by either of the Counties establishing the point to which he surveyed, as the proper and legally established corner of Said Hamilton or Comanche Counties, he also stated that his report of the work done by him in 1880, was destroyed by fire when Court House burned in 1885 five years after the survey was made, he also stated that

he had also surveyed the South
line of Hamilton County in 1891 & 1892
under an order issued out of the
District Court of Hamilton County
and that the distance from the South
East corner of said Hamilton County
to the East line of Mills County as
established December 1887 to be 33
miles and 1500 varas at which place
he planted a very large stone marked
S.W.H.C. which I found as described.
I also state that by his late survey
of the West line of Hamilton County
and East line of Mills County he
is 2900 varas S 66° W from said stone
under existing circumstances and from
the best evidence obtainable I could not
do otherwise than that which I did.
3^d I state that on the 20th of April 1898
as no one appeared to represent
Comanche^{County} and Mr Sarow refusing
to accept what I understood to be the
West line of Comanche County from
the best evidence obtainable, I
proceeded alone to survey, mark and
establish the boundary line between
Mills, Comanche, Hamilton and
Lampasas^{Counties} respectively. I state further
that during the day of the 20th of April
Mr P.A. Chamberlain representing
Lampasas County joined me and
remained with me till I reached
the South line of Hamilton County
but stated that he could not accept
the line without further evidence, this

he gave as his reason for refusing to join me in Surveying, marking and establishing the line between Mills and Lampasas Counties, he suggested that we accept the West line of Hamilton County as was then being surveyed by H. P. Saxon as the true West line of Hamilton County which I refused to do for reasons heretofore state he (P. A. Chamberlain) also asked me to adopt the South line of Hamilton County as surveyed by E. Brown in 1887 before Mills County was organized which I could not do it being three degrees off of the proper course and besides I have sufficient evidence to convince me that he began his work some distance N 30° W from the N.W. corner of Coryell County all of which I respectfully submit.
