The Winter Playground of America

In San Antonio winter only serves to accentuate the perfume of roses and give an added zest to life in the open. Roses bloom in the shelter of swaying palms and the great Outdoors trumpets "welcome" at every turn.

Is it any wonder, then, that San Antonio is the mecca for eager golfers from all directions?



They come from coast to coast to make the city's numerous sporty courses their winter "stamping ground." Here Maine shakes hands with Michigan; New York waves to Illinois.

Ideal links, to which ice and snow are perfect strangers, await the visitor. Here you can play to your hearts's content, one satisfying day after another—making smashing drives, overcoming hazards and finally holing out on grass greens of velvety smoothness. Go where you may, no better courses are to be found the country over.

The 18-hole Municipal course, located in Brackenridge Park, is perhaps the most famous of the city's links.

Not only are players welcome on this course the year around, but it is the scene of the annual Texas Open Championship Tournament, an event which attracts the country's leading professionals. The prize list is the largest offered for any tournament in the United States.

An altitude of 700 feet above sea level gives San Antonio a dry, clear atmosphere. This lack of humidity is one of the first things to impress the visitor, whether he comes in summer or winter. Prostrations from heat are un-

known and in the winter months it is only on rare occasions that temperature causes the slightest discomfort, so dry is the air. The mean annual temperature is 67.9 degrees.

Although the rainfall is adequate for agricultural needs, it is so evenly distributed over the year that pleasure seekers are caused no inconvenience. There is no "rainy season." Cloudless skies greet the visitor for more than 300 days in the year.

An Old World Atmosphere

A quaint Latin atmosphere adds a lazy charm to the delights of a sojourn in San Antonio. Down meandering side streets are tucked fascinating bits of old Mexico.

In the heart of town stands the Alamo, an ivy-covered monument to a glorious fight for liberty. South of the city are the missions-five gray pearls strung on a white highway-mute tributes to the faith of the "padres" who carried the cross of civilization into the wilderness two hundred years ago.

The Sunken Garden is world-famous for its beauty





ranging in size from hundreds of acres down to quaint little beauty spots tucked away in unsuspected quarters. Modern commerce flows around the several plazas that are the centers from which the city

has grown.

In Brackenridge Park is the Sunken Garden, a fairy-land



of semi-tropical loveliness. Here, too, is the municipal golf course, polo field, tennis courts, rifle range, bathing beach, and other facilities for recreation.

Having its headwaters above Brackenridge Park, the San Antonio River winds its picturesque way through the heart of town, traveling twenty miles to go a distance of six.

One of San Antonio's chief claims to greatness is the purity of its artesian water supply. Bubbling up in crystal clearness from a depth of 1200 feet, the water never sees the light of day until it flows from faucets. Seventeen wells provide more than 50,000,000 gallons daily.

Analysis reveals that this water is free from all impu-

rities, very low in mineral content, and can be used with every assurance of absolute wholesomeness. Nature produces nothing more pure! San Antonio's artesian water is the purest in the world

The "Happy Hunting Ground"

If you would match your aim against the fleetness of bigpronged bucks, bag wild turkey in sequestered haunts, bring down your limit of ducks, flush quail from their hiding place—then come to San Antonio!

Within a short distance of town the hunter discovers a land of heart's desire; a region in which the far-stretching wooded hills and dales abound with many different kinds of game. Every day during the open season sportsmen bring back from the field tangible evidence of their skill with rifle and shotgun. Deer is the favorite quest of a majority who go forth, with wild turkey running a close second.

However, many take keen pleasure in duck and bird

shooting. Doves and quail are plentiful and ducks are found in large numbers on nearby

lakes.

Even the lowly jack rabbit and chattering squirrel come in for attention from nimrods who like to "keep their hand in" on small game.

Among the sports followed here is that of wolf hunting, under the auspices of an associa-

tion of sport lovers. Exciting hunts are staged at intervals, with trained dogs in the leading role. Picking up the trail, these dogs run the wolves down or corner them in lairs.

The Chamber of Commerce facilitates the pleasure of visiting sportsmen by supplying full information about the best places to go for any particular game and by assisting in the arrangement of hunting parties.

Medina Lake America's Greatest Black Bass Fishing Ground

Only an hour's drive from San Antonio over a hard surfaced highway is Medina Lake, conceded to be the country's premier resort for black bass fishing.

The lake is 18 miles long by about 2 miles wide. It is the largest and most beautiful body of fresh water in the entire Southwest. Approximately \$7,000,000.00 was spent in constructing the massive dam which impounds this

enormous volume of water for irrigation purposes.

But it is the fighting black bass that has made Medina Lake a familiar name to devotees of the reel. The lake fairly teems with these game members of the finny tribe.

Bass weighing as much as nine pounds have been landed after exciting fights and the ordinary catch ranges from two pounds up. Any fisherman who has cast a line on Lake Medina will testify to the prize strings that are brought in daily. The lake is kept well stocked from a government hatchery and rigid enforcement of the game laws insures continued growth of the sport. In addition to bass, perch, crappie and channel cat are among the fish caught in large numbers.

Duck shooting is also a favorite pastime and surrounding hills are alive with game.

Lake Medina nestles in the mountains at an elevation of 1080 feet and, in addition to its fishing, is famous as a recreation center. Its wooded shores and cliffs are dotted with comfortable lodges and taverns for visitors and the country homes of San Antonians. Scores of fast motor boats and numerous house boats have a place on the lake. Regattas, swimming contests and other aquatic sports are popular.

Hills and Waterways Return Rich Rewards

One of the reasons why San Antonio possesses such a strong attraction for sportsmen is because of the practically limitless field in the choice of game in the territory of which this city is the center.

Disciples of Isaac Walton do not search beyond Medina Lake, unless they want the thrill of landing a tarpon. In this case the Gulf coast to the southwest, where the "silver king," mackerel and other deep water fish have their abode, is easily and quickly reached by motor car or train.

As already stated, deer and wild turkey hunting is to be had within an easy radius of the city. For longer hunting trips the many big ranches in this section offer a fertile base of operations. While some of these ranches are posted, in most cases arrangements can be made for hunting privileges. If you are in search of doves and quail, it is only necessary to proceed a little beyond the city's outskirts to keep your gun warm. 1.000





Nearby lakes and ponds are favorite haunts for ducks of every kind. Teal, bluebills, red-heads, pin-tails, and canvas-backs dot the waters of Medina Lake. The wily mallard haunts the coves and marshes in secluded spots. The whistling wings and constant "bang" of guns are welcome sounds that thrill the sportsman's heart.

And then the coast, a field preferred by some, invitingly awaits, a few hours ride by car or train. Huge flights of ducks and geese stir the imagination and invite comparison to any found south of

Alaska. Hundreds of hunters spend happy days along the bays that fringe the Gulf of Mexico and none returns without a word of praise. Duck shooting, that gem of sports, is indeed no better anywhere than in the territory surrounding San Antonio.

Although extensive development has been carried on as evidenced by the prosperous truck gardens, farms and ranches in this section, countless fertile acres still await the magic touch of cultivation. Land in Southwest Texas is surprisingly cheap in comparison with smaller and more thickly settled regions. And on farms down here crops are grown the vear around!

Because of fertile soil and ideal climatic conditions, more and more acreage is being planted in winter fruits and vegetables. Carloads of luscious strawberries are shipped to hungry markets in the north and east at a season when they bring top prices. Citrus fruits from this section are unsurpassed for taste and quality.

Eighty-odd Churches

In San Antonio a total of 87 church spires raise beckoning stone fingers to followers of their faith. Mass is still solemnized in ancient missions and cathedral bells call worshipers in tones the Indians once heard.

Moss-covered churches, facing verdant plazas, have settled down in their resting places like placid grey doves. And in sharp contrast are the many stately edifices of modern construction. Virtually every faith is represented here.

Housing the Three "Rs"

San Antonio's 91 schools and colleges provide educational facilities of the most comprehensive sort. There are more than 40 private institutions of learning-comprising large and well equipped sectarian schools supported by various denominations, military academies of high rating, private boarding schools and schools of music and art.

The public school system is most complete. In addition to an adequate number of ward schools, it embraces three high schools, and six junior high schools, all modernly equipped. Free text books are furnished, under a state law.



A bright and airy public Library is the daily mecca of hundreds, who while away pleasant hours in its peaceful shelter. A permanent Art Exhibit and a Museum of Natural History hold interest for many.

Public improvements have been carried forward on a tremendous scale in San Antonio over a period of the last ten years. Millions of dollars have been spent for paved streets, on enlargement of the park system and for other municipal works that make for beauty, convenience and permanance. But citizens are not content to rest on past records and performances. New civic undertakings are being inaugurated from month to month in the program of maintaining the city in its rightful position as the metropolis of Texas.

The Army Lends Color

Every branch of the service is represented in the 8th Corps Area, of which Fort Sam Houston is headquarters. The Alamo City is home to the famous Second Division, and



here, too, are the army's greatest flying schools and aviation fields.

The burnished wings of planes flash over the city at all hours. A regiment of cavalry clatters across town on its way to maneuvers. On the stillness of night "taps" re-echoes sweetly.

Since long before the Civil War, San Antonio has been an important army center. Among the illustrious soldiers who have been stationed here appear the names of Robert E. Lee, Theodore Roosevelt, Frederick Funston and John J. Pershing. Every branch of the military service is represented



It was from San Antonio that General Pershing was called to lead American troops to glorious victory in the World War.

Visitors find keen interest in watching the army at work and at play. One day a mimic battle is staged; the next, scores of planes ascend in impressive fighting formation. Polo tournaments, horse shows and the gay social life in army circles add a cosmopolitan brilliance to playtime in San Antonio.

The dash and verve contributed by the army, and the traditions of the city's Latin founders blend in a gracious hospitality which is peculiarly San Antonio's own. There is no "stranger within the gate" here. All are made to feel at home.
